### About Us

#### Introduction

The early years of a child's life are important and we need to support families in caregiving for the young. Developing social and emotional competencies in children and youths go a long way to helping them build resilience to manage challenges that come in life.

Suncare SG's vision and mission is thus to build programmes and empower communities so that the well-being of children and youths is focused on from the early years. We will support families in caregiving, and pilot programmes to build social and emotional competencies in our young. We will collaborate with like-minded organisations and government agencies to give our children the best chances of reaching their full potential, regardless their family situation.



#### Our Approach

Suncare SG will act as an incubator to build programmes that are firmly science backed and outcome-driven to rigorously pilot and evaluate evidence-based programmes with partners. Programmes that prove to be feasible and effective will be presented to government agencies for consideration to be scaled up and implemented nationwide so that they can be accessible to all.



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# Message from the Chairman

I am deeply honoured to be serving as the Chairman of Suncare SG, a new and very different sort of charity. We believe that Singapore's most important natural resource, her people, must be nurtured from childhood to develop their full potential so that everyone can have a purpose-filled life and play their part in Singapore's progress. As a nascent charity, we cannot hope to fulfil our mission by ourselves. Only by working with the different child development scientists, early childhood educators, social workers, psychologists, school teachers, youth workers, NGOs, government agencies, ministries, funders, volunteers, and community leaders, can we hope to make an impact. In addition to strong and diverse partnerships, good interventions must be underpinned by sound research and thoughtful implementation, and what we hope to do is to catalyze and implement programs to help our young develop the necessary social and emotional competencies to be able to learn easily, interact well, and take care of themselves and others with kindness, empathy, and responsibility.

Research has found that it takes 17 years on average for scientific data to be incorporated into real practice. To speed this up, we need to strengthen transdisciplinary partnerships between scientists, social workers, policy makers and the community. Using an incubator model, Suncare SG will bring various parties together to co-create programs with the community. Our aim is to test community interventions and to rigorously evaluate their feasibility, scalability, and impact. Once we have a model of care that we are confident can be implemented durably and deliver the desired outcomes, we will hand them over to the appropriate agencies for mainstreaming.

At steady state, Suncare SG hopes to run about two to three pilot community interventions at any one time, with each lasting about two to three years. Once these pilots are fully evaluated, and consistently found to deliver the outcomes we desire, we will work with the appropriate governmental and other agencies to scale up and maintain them. Suncare SG's deliverables will be the community programs we successfully mainstream as well as the community Lighthouses we set up to help the youth of Singapore grow up happy and productive.



# The Year in review

Suncare SG has been registered as a charity under the Charities Act with effective from 17 October 2022






You Matter is a youth peer support training programme co-curated by Suncare SG with Singapore Association for Mental Health (SAMH), Samaritans of Singapore (SOS) and Campus PSY (Peer Support for Youths) who are keen to support the holistic well being of our young people.

You Matter focuses on each individual as the lynchpin of society. Every person is significant. Whether a sufferer, a supporter, a friend or a stranger. Each of us impacts another and every interaction is an opportunity to enlarge circles of well-being such that we create ripples of hope across our community.

> You Power is a volunteer-led weekly programme which matches children and youths from underprivileged families with study and personal development mentor. Lessons are drawn from the games with the intention to build into the lives of both mentors and mentees.

A success story that brings encouragement to the team is about a Primary 3 year old boy who used to come and walk around disturbing other students with a disinterested attitude towards learning. Within 2 sessions with his appointed mentor, increased his attention span.

Over 6 sessions, he now completes his work and actively participates in the games played conducted in the centre. His engagements encourages his mentors to commit deeper; fulfilling a



KidsREAD is an NLB programme to promote the love for reading, Suncare SG launched both the Junior club (4-6 years old ) and the Senior club (7-8 years old) on the 25 February this year.

Impacting more than 30 children and growing, positive feedback includes parents citing that their children enjoyed coming to KidsREAD every Saturday though its only a 1-hour session with many coming early because they enjoyed spending time with our volunteers here. The quality of the sessions have expanded to a community being built.



# Our Policy

### **Funding Sources**

Suncare SG is a charity that supports the well-being of children and youths by building programmes and equipping communities to support the social and emotional wellbeing of children and youth in Singapore. Our clients benefit from an incubation model from science backed research. Suncare SG is supported by donations and government grants.

### Conflict of interest Policy

Suncare SG has put in place a conflict of interest policy to assist in identifying and managing potential areas of conflict. All board members, key management personnel, staff members and volunteers have to declare any situation of conflict that may arise. But members and key management personnel do not vote and abstain from decision-making when conflicts of interest arise.

### **HR** Policy

Staff at Suncare SG undergo a yearly performance review, during which they are appraised. During the session, performance appraisals are done between the Executive Director and the staff members, and clear goals are set for their performance. Volunteer tutors receive performance feedback through classroom observations throughout the academic year, while volunteer hotline counsellors receive feedback through supervision by the head of counselling services. Salary increments and staff remuneration are recommended for approval by board of Suncare SG on a yearly basis.

### Reserves Policy

The reserves that we have set aside provide financial stability and the means for the development of our principal activity. Suncare SG raises funds to support our current and future services to reach out to more young people and their families in need, up to a maximum of 2 years our projected future gross operating expenses.
